Ev. Lutheran Worship / Common Praise

If you have been to one of the weddings that I officiate at quite often you will hear the only Biblical Greek lesson I give. It is on the Greek words for love. You see in English we have the one word LOVE which is supposed to mean so many things. In the Greek there are three words for love: Philia, Eros and Agape.

I tell the couples that Philia love is much like the love within communities and between friends. Buddy love, connecting love. I "love to do..." love.

Eros love – well... I tend to tell the wedding couple to ask their parents to describe that. I figure that they'd be too embarrassed to know their priest knows that type of love.

But the greatest of these is Agape – a sacrificial love. A love so perfectly modelled in Jesus' life and ministry. A love that give all – even to the point of death. A love that gave up everything for those around him. For a couple sacrificial love doesn't always mean a physical death – but may mean a spiritual or an emotional death. As compromises might have to be made, dreams changed and plans adjusted.

It is a love that is no longer about I but about us. It is a relationship of perfect trust, support and care. Not looking for anything – but getting so much.

May we be blessed with relationships of love: Philia, eros and agape.

May we be agents of that love. Here and always.

More work in February.

- Some elements of the parish meeting are informational – so council members can inform others; some elements are "figuring things out", which result in a decision, or motion, and a vote; and some elements are "ongoing", which means we will talk about them again There are decisions that next time. apply to all of the Churches within the Parish, and elements of worship and practice that need to be standard among all the Churches, too. Then there are decisions that are referred to, or left to, the individual Churches. The culture of each Church needs be distinctive.

Pastoral Concerns When to Share, How to Share

From time to time we visit folks from our Parish Family, residents in Long Term Care, hospitals or in their homes. Or we hear via the grape vine that they are

In distress, scheduled for surgery and we know that they are in need of our prayers.

During all of our Pastoral Care Training we were asked this question. 'When is it appropriate to share or pass on this information with our Pastor/Priest,

Prayer chain or send this information on by e-mail or other means?



The answer is, only when you have the permission of the person, or asked to do so by their closest next of kin or their Power of Attorney.

When we abide by this we honour their privacy and observe the rules as listed in our 'Safe Church and Privacy Policy"

For this reason, Pr. Brad and members of the Pastoral Care team (those who make official visits on behalf of the parish) have to respect anyone's privacy and cannot share information unless they have been given permission.

Pr. Brad always appreciates this information, however a simply "do you want Pr. Brad to know" goes along way.

TOGETHER, let us care for those among us. Being Christ in the midst of illness, pain and despair.




PAR & Offerings

A Christian is a follower of Christ

The following letter to the editor was shared at a recent Parish Mutual Ministry Committee meeting – it was thought that it would be good to share in the KEY.

Editor:

I am writing in response to the Editorial in The Sun Times on Dec. 16-- The 3 R's: religious, right and rude.

I read the article, then re-read it, this time trying to guess what Jesus' reaction would be. As children, a lot of us were familiar with the prayer that started with, "Gentle Jesus, Meek and Mild". As we grew up and started reading for ourselves about this gentle Jesus, we discovered that He was gentle indeed where little children were concerned, or thieves or prostitutes, or murderers. He was kind and loving and forgiving. He was also demanding He was quick to say "You're forgiven", but often would follow up with, "Now go, and sin no more."

That same gentleness fell away quickly whenever He had dealings with the religious element of the day. He had no patience with the leaders of the synagogue with their legalism and rules and sacrifices.

There was absolutely no limit to what he would do (did do, actually) for the outcasts of society, the sinners, the poor and "down trodden" or anyone else who believed He was God's Son and was willing to put their faith in Him.

Because I am a Christian, my first impulse is to come to the defence of another Christian, but in many cases, like the ones mentioned in your article, it is hard to come up with a legitimate defence. How can a Christian say he would like a Holy Ghost machine gun so he could blow somebody's head off? Perhaps we would all (by we, I mean we Christians) be better off if we

judged ourselves as strongly as we judge others.

Christ said we are to love our enemies and to pray for those who despise us. He also told His disciples that the Ten Commandments tell us not to kill, but that He would go further than that and say that if I hate someone and/or wish him dead, I am just as guilty of murder as the one holding the gun.

A Christian, to my way of thinking anyway, is a follower of Christ, not a member of any particular religious group. We may meet together with other like minded people in a building with a specific name above the door, but joining in with that group isn't what makes us Christian.

It is because we are Christian that we want to get together with others and worship God together. If that is indeed the case, then everything we say or do should fall right in line with our Leader and what He would say or do under the same circumstances.

Christ referred to Himself as the tree, and we (His followers) as the branches. The fruit that the branches bear is our first clue as to what kind of a tree it is. If there is a big sign on the tree that says "Apple Tree", but there are cherries growing on the branches, I think it's safe to say that the sign is wrong. If I claim to be a follower of Christ but what you see in my life is very un-Christ like, you might want to question the original claim. Either it is totally wrong, or I am desperately in need of a wake-up call.

Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy Book Study

Pr. Brad will be leading a book study during Lent (and beyond). We will gather on Tuesdays at Christ Church from 9:30 to 11:30, beginning March 22nd.

The book we will be reading is <u>Bonhoeffer:</u> <u>Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy</u> written by Eric Metaxas and published by Thomas Nelson in 2010.

You can either purchase the book directly or contact Pr. Brad as he will make a bulk order at the end of February. The current price is under \$25 per book.

What follows is a review of the book.

The historical biography genre is alive and well in the hands of Eric Metaxas...his book about famous pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer is so fluid and alive that it transports the reader to another world. That the subject matter of Dietrich Bonhoeffer is eminently important is beyond a doubt and Metaxas weaves an incredibly readable and highly relevant biography that captures details that have been missed or downplayed in other sources.

It is something when you can say that a biography is so compelling you find it hard to put down but this is just such a biography. Metaxas writes with a clear awareness of the relevance of Bonhoeffer to our own culture and emphasizes certain aspects of his life and theology such as the question of "what is the church?" Truly a biography for our time.

The author's biographical skills are not the only thing showcased in the text, his attention to historical detail is also constantly at the fore.

For those who know and appreciate Bonhoeffer you will be very happy with Metaxas' treatment of him. If you are unaware of him or simply not a fan of biographies I cannot stress enough how important it is for you to check out this book. You will be introduced to a person who will challenge and sharpen you and you will be given a wonderful and unique perspective about a critical period in world history - early 20th century Europe.

I promise you that this book will not disappoint...it will be a measure of what a biography should be for years to come.
